




Year 1/2



What age can a child come home from school alone?



There's no legal age that your child can travel home from school alone — this is up to you and your best judgement, or your school's rules and policies.

However, you should nev<mark>er le</mark>ave a child <mark>alone</mark> who isn't ready or is unable to care for them-

Every child is different — but some schools advise children under 8 shouldn't walk ho<mark>me</mark> without an adult or older sibling.

If you and your child do feel they're ready to come home alone, it helps to go over some rules about staying safe.

- Make sure they know their address and your telephone number by heart, in case they get lost or have to navigate home from somewhere new
- If they have a mobile phone, remind them to fully charge it before leaving the house, and make sure they have all your contact numbers saved.
- Talk to them about road safety. They should always look both ways before crossing the street, and never be on their phone whilst crossing a road.
- Remind them never to accept a lift from someone they don't know, or let a stranger into the house. They should never give personal information away in real life or online.
- Remind them that if they feel unsafe or uncomfortable at any time, they can call you or a trusted adult.
- If they ever feel like they're in immediate danger, they should call the police straight away on 999.

Ref: Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme Easter 2024

The HAF Programme is fully funded by the Government and enables your child to access a variety of exciting activities over the Easter, Summer and Christmas school holidays as well as receiving a cooked meal.

Children can book and access up to 4 sessions in the Easter holidays and some programmes are offering family events or outings for those children that **attend** sessions. Additional sessions maybe available but will be charged for. Please enquire, direct with your local HAF provider for further details.

Children have the same unique code available to use for each holiday's so those issued previously are still valid.

You will need to enquire and book, direct with the provider, who may require sight of your letter you received with your child/s code previously and reference code to confirm your space.

It is important that if you book onto a HAF scheme and then cannot attend any of the days, that you let the provider know and cancel your space so another child can attend. As per our non-attendance policy, if you do not notify your provider in advance, your bookings will be cancelled for the remainder of that holiday and may not be accepted to make future bookings.
